Nones gain 3 percent in one year, with the largest gain among Gen Z – topping out now at 46.7 percent.

The most momentous change in American religion over the last 25 years has been the growth of the religious nones from 5 percent in 1994 to 34 percent in 2019. Perhaps the dominant explanation for that rise has been the contentious and extreme politics of the Religious Right, which gained prominence in 1994 through the Republican takeover of Congress for the first time in 40 years.

While the growth of the nones has been steady across this time period, recently we observed what seemed like a plateau in 2018 and suggested, tentatively, that the decline of American religion may be slowing. In particular, the youngest adult generation ("Z") was not irreligious at a higher rate than Millennials.

Let's get right to it. The figure (right) shows the percent of each generation in 2018 and 2019 who identify as a religious none, which is a composite measure of those picking atheist, agnostic, or 'nothing in particular.' It is clear to see that the plateau in 2018 was temporary and that the growth of the nones has resumed. In just the past year, each generation from the Boomers on down has gained 2-5 percent nones, with the largest gain among Gen Z – they top out now at 46.7 percent. This shift mirrors the gains across this year as the nones went from 31.3 to 34.3 percent.
